
Chiran Dedunupitiya




**Robert "Bob" Devolin** Superintendent, 11th Division Peel Regional Police Appointee

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

Crime prevention and public safety programs can take many forms, from reducing opportunities for crime through improving the environment and ensuring better urban planning, to early intervention and social and community development. Traditionally, the police and the criminal justice system have been responsible for ensuring public safety and preventing crime. Crime Prevention Approach: Crime Prevention through Social Development Service: Education



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Developed as a Pilot Program in 2009 through the Region of Peel's Neighbourhood Capacity Support Strategy. Aspire aims to affect crime prevention through social development through an offering of one on one tutoring services for K-6th graders from 3-6pm, Monday through Friday.

We know that a good experience with schoolwork boosts confidence, social interaction and creates a foundation for hope. We also know that those qualities and attributes counter youth crime and violence.

### Program Objectives

- Provide elementary school students with after school tutoring services in their neighbourhood by youth from local high schools.
- Provide high school students with an opportunity to give back to their community while earning community service hours by providing tutoring services to children.

### **ASPIRE RESULTS**

### Focus Group 2010

- A focus group of ten tutors matched with fifteen students was used to determine the effects of the program
- These results were obtained after four-months of weekly sessions with a tutor

When a child is competent at school and has faith in their abilities, it is less likely that they will engage in delinquent behaviours.

#### **Outcome One: Improvement in grades**

Parental Evaluation: Approximately 92% of parents observed an improvement

Tutor Evaluation: Approximately 74% of tutors observed an improvement

**Outcome Two: Improvement in family relationships** Approximately 89% of parents noted improved family relationships

**Outcome Three: Improvement in self-confidence** Parental Evaluation: Approximately 87% of parents observed an improvement

Tutor Evaluation: Approximately 70% of tutors observed an improvement

## Safest City Report

Crime Prevention Approach: Developmental Crime Prevention & Situational Crime Prevention Service: Education & Community Mobilization

First developed in the mid-1970's the Counter-Act program is founded on the principles of Developmental Crime Prevention.

Through the Counter-Act program, Grade 4 students within Mississauga's elementary schools have the opportunity to obtain training through a good citizenship presentation to develop the attributes of respect, responsibility and ownership. Students learn how they, their families, and everyone in the community are hurt by vandalism and graffiti.

The program also encourages participation in a Service Project to educate their school community on the effects and consequences of vandalism and graffiti.

### Program Objectives

- Enable grade 4 students to obtain awareness and education training that will enable them to make the right decision when at a crossroads regarding the act of vandalism.
- Provide a local positive role model.
- Empower children to take on an ambassador role in their school community, to educate and inform others about crime prevention and safety learned while in the Counter-Act program.

New this eleventh year, crime rates were compared with 33 Canadian urban centres having populations in excess of 150,000 individuals over the age of 15.

## Crossroads Youth Academy

### Crime Prevention Approach: Community Crime Prevention Service: Education

Developed in 2003 from a desire to involve and interest youth in crime prevention and personal safety, this program is based on a network of partnerships that rallies a diverse group of community stakeholders into a cohesive crime prevention and safety team, that directly delivers customized crime prevention and safety training to high school youth within Mississauga.

Internationally recognized, the winner of the 2005 Best Community Crime Prevention Program, the Crossroads Youth Academy motivates and empowers youth to avoid criminal activities, become informed about being a good citizen and provides them the knowledge to make healthy decisions when they find themselves at one of life's Crossroads.

### Program Objectives

### **TWO PHASE DELIVERY**

### Phase 1: The Academy Phase

Designed to equip participants with the knowledge and skills to stay safe and avoid victimization. Over an eight week period, the following one hour Prevention topics are presented as in school training:

- -
- The Basics of Crime Prevention and Personal Safety
- Internet Safety
- Drug Prevention Education
- Counterfeit Detection
- Fraud and Gambling
- Youth Employment Awareness
- Staying Safe & Avoiding Trouble
- Healthy Relationships (The Fourth 'R')
- CPR Training (offered as an elective component)

**Phase 2: The Service Phase** 

Following the Academy Phase participants work to develop Crime Prevention Educational Campaigns to share what they have learned within the Academy Phase with those in their school community.

Taking on this Ambassador role allows these participants to educate and inform others about crime prevention and safety techniques learned while in the Academy Phase not only within their school, but also in the community.

### 2010 Outcomes



Every City Needs a Hero, and on Neighbours Night Out, that hero is YOU!








## Neighbourhood Watch

*Crime Prevention Approach:* Community Crime Prevention & Situational Crime Prevention *Service:* Community Mobilization & Education

### Safe City Mississauga has been the leading organization supporting the Neighbourhood Watch program since our inception in 1992.

According to Statistics Canada, 94% of Canadians are satisfied with their personal safety from crime. However, 88% rank the necessity of living in a safe and secure environment to be among the nine most important issues in Canada. It is without a doubt that people remain concerned about crime and delinquency in their neighbourhood.

The Neighbourhood Watch Program is founded upon the principles of Situational Crime Prevention used to mitigate criminal activity on a neighbourhood level. Situational crime prevention is a safety measure that is based on the knowledge that potential offenders will be deterred from committing criminal acts if they feel a high degree of likeliness that they will get caught.

INCREASING THE RISKSREDUCING THE REWARDS

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Neighbourhood Watch is advantageous for businesses, private residental homes, townhouse complexes, community housing and apartment/condo buildings.

Harold G. Shipp HERO Award WINNER: DEANLEE MANAGEMENT INC.

#### Mayor Hazel McCallion HERO Award WINNER: MR. JOHN LEE

Mr. Lee is a Canadian Veteran, indicating that his interest in keeping people safe goes beyond the City of Mississauga. Mr. Lee has taken incredible care in searching for just the right person to take over as Coordinator for the area upon his retirement from the position and has dedicated his life to crime prevention and mobilizing the community.

#### Bell Junior HERO Award WINNER: MR. MICHEL GUIDE

The Bell Junior Hero Award is presented to an outstanding young person who is instrumental in finding ways to contribute to crime prevention amongst their peers or in their community.

The recipient of the Bell Junior Hero Award has shown his commitment to Crime Prevention, through his active participation in the IMPACT Youth Advisory Group, initiated in May 2009 by the Peel Youth Violence Prevention Network. Mr. Guide was one of the first members of IMPACT and has represented the values of this Youth Advisory with charisma, passion, dedication, and an overall service excellence.

In the summer of 2009, Mr. Guide played an active leadership role in shaping IMPACT's identity by helping to create a slogan and logo, and helped to plan the groups first event in Peel 'One Act Impacts', in October 2009. The event, named after the Advisory's slogan, was an enormous success. Mr. Guide continues to stay involved with IMPACT and has been a wonderful role model, not only for other Youth members, but for the Adult Mentors attached to the group as well.



#### Ron Lenyk HERO Award WINNER: MR. RON CUNNINGHAM

The Ron Lenyk Hero Award is presented to an outstanding local volunteer that has made an extraordinary single contribution to crime prevention in Mississauga.

This year's recipient is the founder of Citizens for the Advancement of Community Development, a registered charitable organization located in Mississauga in which he works tirelessly, and gratuitously as the Executive Director to make a difference in high priority neighbourhoods while working to transform the lives of youth by providing preventative, positive life strategies to dissuade youth from making negative choices that may lead to violence and contact with the criminal justice system.

Mr. Cunningham has arranged numerous crime and violence forums within the community, been awarded the Peace Medallion for his work on Peace and Development, and was instrumental in initiating Community Based Policing activities in Jamaica, which brought a new level of trust and cooperative action between the Jamaican Constabulary Force and the community in which they serve.

### CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN (C.P.T.E.D.)

In association with situational crime prevention, C.P.T.E.D. is a preventative form of crime prevention that reduces opportunities for criminal activity. The primary tactic for mitigating criminal activity is implementing specific design principles and altering the built environment to make it difficult and unattractive for those intending to offend.

C.P.T.E.D principles empower neighbourhood watch members to maintain their properties' landscaping and visibility, implement target hardening strategies for their properties and establish territoriality over their neighbourhood to deflect criminals.

### **PARTICIPATE IN 4 EASY STEPS**

STEP 1 – Contact Safe City Mississauga via phone, email, or through our online registration to receive the Neighbourhood Watch Information Package.


STEP 2 – Following review of the Information Package, the Watch size is determined with help from Safe City Mississauga.

STEP 3 – A canvass of the Watch area is completed to ensure an accurate list of participants is provided. A canvass can be completed via a personal visit, or through a postcard canvass done either by the resident, or Safe City Mississauga. 50% participation of the Watch area is required in order to have a Neighbourhood Watch.

STEP 4 – A Set-Up meeting will be held at a time and location convenient for neighbours with Safe City Mississauga and Peel Regional Police to provide Crime Prevention training, as well as distribute decals (windows stickers).

A community is only as strong as its spirit. Residents must take responsibility for their communities to improve their quality of life and local safety and security in conjunction with community partnerships.











### *Crime Prevention Approach:* Community Crime Prevention *Service:* Awareness & Education

In 2010, Safe City Mississauga strategically focused on developing a two-way ongoing communication with the residents of Mississauga to achieve a greater awareness of how to prevent crime. We launched a Lock Your Car Campaign and a Holiday reminder to keep your home secure, especially during the holiday season. It was a small step but as anyone will tell you, the first step is always the hardest. Safe City Mississauga identified the need for public information and education relations to be a formalized program as it is the primary means in which to inform and mobilize a citywide ongoing conversation on crime prevention. It is our knowledgeable intent to invest in building a society on crime prevention, sensitizing citizens to their role in crime prevention and creating a positive social climate for the acceptance of an individual's role and responsibility in the wider public for crime prevention. The PIER program plans for active participation of the public and the construction of positive reinforcement which allows a proactive action.



### Harnessing the Evidence – Harnessing what Works Post Report on the 2010 Crime Prevention Conference


On Saturday, September 11, 2010, Safe City Mississauga and University of Toronto Mississauga hosted our first Crime Prevention Conference. An integrated and shared vision of how local action can help to create safer cities began in October 1989, twenty years ago, when the first European and North American conference on Urban Safety and the Prevention of Crime was held in Montreal. Investing smartly in the safety for the City of Mississauga requires a sound and effective model to guide crime reduction through a systematic planning and implementation process that will ensure that we address problems in an effective manner.


The Community Crime Prevention Conference looked at national and international best practice and knowledge. We discussed common risk factors for crime and evidence about successful ways of reducing crime and preventing victimization. The conference offered a forum to debate strategies for mobilizing governments, schools, housing, social services, policing and families to tackle those risk factors on a sustained and collaborative basis. All of which will lead to a Mississauga action plan to reduce crime more effectively.

Each annual conference will build upon the last to enhance the success of Crime Prevention in Mississauga and its action plan. This inaugural conference focused on the evidence of crime prevention by identifying model and promising crime prevention practices as well as the tools used in their selection and implementation - hence the theme, 'harnessing the evidence - harnessing what works'.

Based on the outcome analysis, the conference stakeholders, host, presenters, organizers, volunteers and sponsors can rest assure that the conference is a positive investment as the principal way to raise awareness of the individual commitment required to prevent and reduce crime and find the tools available to support the communities, broadly defined to include groups of people, neighbourhoods, similar interest like business groups, or around a particular activity, like sports. We will continue to track these and other identified outcomes added in the subsequent years.
