Halloween Safety Tips!



If you're going out:

• Enjoy the festivities, but remain aware of suspicious behaviour! Halloween can provide a perfect cover for criminal activity.

Make sure you are visible! Ensure costumes and clothing bear bright colours or visibility strips!

- Make sure you can see! Masks should fit well to ensure proper vision. Consider bringing a small flashlight as well.
- Use the buddy system!:Whether you're a parent supervising your child, or if your child is going out with friends, make sure they are never alone and have a planned route that you are aware of.
- Check all candies before eating them! Throw out anything that seems tampered or opened. Throw out any raw foods (ex. fruits) or handmade treats as well (unless you know and trust the source).

If you're staying in:

• Have fun with the decorations, but make sure your property is still safe, well lit, and free of hazards.

• Store valuables in a safe place! This is especially true for Halloween when you might be expecting many

strangers coming on and off your property.


• If you decide not to participate in the festivities, consider putting a sign on your door alerting trick or treaters that you do not have candy to give. This is better than simply not answering the door and making your home look unoccupied. Remember, we always want our homes to look lived in to deter criminals!


